- 1 Hitler's scientists set out to develop weapons that might bring the Second World War to a successful conclusion for Germany. "Intelligence" reports confirmed that a new terror weapon (later called the "V-1 flying bomb") was being produced at a weapons' base on the Baltic coast called Peenemünde. The night of 17th/18th August 1943 saw the bombing of Peenemünde by the Royal Air Force, which set back production of those terror weapons by several months.
- 2 The "V-1" was a pilotless flying bomb in the shape of an aeroplane. It needed a long ramp from which to be launched, and then flew at 370 miles per hour. The V-1 used the first jet engines, and carried a calculated amount of fuel such that they would fall and explode on London. They were called "doodlebugs" or "buzzbombs" by Londoners. People felt safe as long as they could still hear the distinctive noise of the plane. When the noise suddenly stopped, everyone knew that the plane with its explosives would quickly hit the ground.
- 3 Films of the time show some of the V-1s being destroyed by anti-aircraft guns from the ground, or by bullets from aeroplanes, or even by having their wings tipped over by the RAF planes, causing them to crash and explode in unpopulated areas.
- 4 The V-weapons were named after the German word for "vengeance". The "V-2" was even more deadly than the "V-1", and did not need ramps to launch it. It was a long-range 14 metre (47 foot) long rocket, with a one-tonne warhead, hitting its target at 3,000 m.p.h (5,000 k.p.h.). Travelling faster than sound, the rockets were not heard before landing.
