

1 After landing on the moon on the 20th July 1969, it was a few hours before Neil Armstrong stepped out onto the moon, followed by Edwin "Buzz" Aldrin. Aldrin later wrote about something he did during those few hours:

2 "There are many thousands of things that God and man have made here on earth and, before I blasted off. I got thinking and wondering what I would choose to take to the moon. So I said: What's our greatest treasure here on earth? And I thought: It's Christ's gift of himself. So, shortly after touchdown, I opened two little plastic packages, one containing bread and the other, wine. I poured the wine into the chalice which our home church had given me, and I read what Saint John tells us that Jesus said: 'I am the vine. you are the branches.' In the one-sixth gravity of the moon the wine curled slowly and gracefully up the side of the cup. It was interesting to think that the very first liquid ever poured on the moon and the very first food eaten there were what Christ chose when he gave himself to be our close friend."

We give thanks for the skills and expertise and the courage and co-operation which led to that successful venture. In giving thanks we recall, too. that the astronauts showed their appreciation and reminded us of important values. We pray for the power of your Spirit in our lives that we may live in thankfulness and be people of vision and courage who have compassion for one another. Amen.
