- 1 Living on the relatively small island of Great Britain, we tend to think in terms of short distances. We may imagine, for example, that Australia and New Zealand are near-neighbours, yet they are 1100 miles apart, with a 2-hour time-difference between New Zealand and the nearest point on the east coast of Australia.
- 2 We may think our own continent of Europe is big, but Africa is almost 3 times the land area of Europe.
- 3 We may have the impression that India is teeming with people. Yet, thinking of an area of land in the United Kingdom occupied on average by 100 people, India has 124 people living in the same area of land. Holland is far more heavily populated with 190 to the same area of land.
- 4 Let us pray:

God our Father, extend our horizons, widen our vision, and remind us how inter-connected we are as your sons and daughters. Breathe your Spirit into us that we may live more truly as brothers and sisters who care for one another. Amen.

- India has about 770 people per square mile (300 per square kilometre), which is only 1.24 times that of the UK, with about 620 people per square mile (240 people per square kilometre). Holland (the Netherlands) is far more densely populated with 1,180 people per square mile (455 people per square kilometre). Source for the figures: 'The Cambridge Factfinder, 1997'.
- Rother James Kimpton, a British De La Salle Brother, has worked in southern India with the poorest of the poor for over 45 years. He has set up "Reaching the Unreached" (RTU) as a means of helping the poor to help themselves. For example, in two of the 'RTU' villages, there are young people from babyhood to high school level who have been orphaned or abandoned. 5 or 6 children are placed with a 'mother' who is a widow or who has been deserted by her husband, but who is now paid to look after these children. Each foster mother runs her house independently as a family, and the children quickly learn to be brothers and sisters. 'RTU' arranges for the children's education and health-care. Each house is an integral part of the village community, giving the children cultural roots and a feeling of belonging.

Visitors to 'RTU' have written: "I am deeply impressed by the beautiful smiles of the children... For years in the U.S. I have worked with abandoned, abused and neglected chil-

dren - but I have never seen any programme so full of love, the foster families so wellplanned, the children so vibrant and healthy."
