- 1 One of the early Christian writers was called Eusebius, and he died about the year 340A.D. He wrote these words which we will make our prayer today:
- 2 May I be no-one's enemy, and God's friend.
 May I never quarrel with those nearest me but, if I do, may I be reconciled quickly.
 May I never plot evil against others, and if anyone plots evil against me may I escape unharmed and without the need to hurt anyone else.
- May I love and seek and achieve only what is good.
 May I desire happiness for all, and may I envy no-one.
 May I never find pleasure at the misfortune of someone who has done wrong to me.
- 4 May I gain no victory
 that harms either me
 or my opponent.
 May I reconcile friends
 who become angry with one another.
 May I, insofar as I can,
 give all necessary help
 to those who are in need,
 and never fail a friend in trouble.
- 5 May I respect myself
 and always keep in control of myself,
 being gentle in attitude
 and never letting circumstances
 make me angry with others.
 May I never discuss the wicked
 or what they have done wrong,
 but know good people
 and follow in their footsteps.
 Amen.
