## MARCH 18

- 1 Tomorrow, 19th March, is the anniversary of the sentencing of six English farmworkers to seven years' transportation in Australia. They are called 'The Tolpuddle Martyrs', after the name of their village in Dorset. Their sentence in 1834 could have resulted in their deaths because of the harsh conditions in the place to which they had been sent. They were sentenced because at that time it was illegal to organise trade union activities in the countryside. Such was the outrage throughout the country that their sentences were cancelled after two years, and they returned to the country as heroes.
- 2 In 1996, over 150 years later, the Catholic Bishops of England and Wales produced a document called 'The Common Good'. In it, they wrote:

"Work is more than a way of making a living: it is a vocation, a participation in God's creative activity...

- 3 "Workers have rights which... include the right to decent work, to just wages, to security of employment, to adequate rest and holidays, to limitation of hours of work, to health and safety protection, to non-discrimination, to form and join trade unions, and, as a last resort, to go on strike."
- 4 Let us pray:

Lord Jesus, lead us to grow in your image and become more fully human. Lead us to respect and value all other people that we may work together for justice for all and the building of your kingdom. Amen.
