18 NOVEMBER

- On this day in 1991 the English hostage, Terry Waite, was released from his 5 years of captivity in the Lebanon. He had been captured whilst trying to negotiate the freeing of other hostages. For a long time he was held in solitary confinement.
- 2 A month after his release, in an interview on TV, Terry Waite described how his faith had helped him during his years of captivity, which had included long periods of solitude, physical and psychological torture, and mock executions. Terry Waite said:
- "My faith came to my aid. The remarkable thing about faith is that it isn't a sudden flash from heaven, or a sudden insight of that kind. It is just something that quietly sustains. I would say to myself: 'You can do your worst, but you can't destroy me - never.' And they didn't."
- 4 He told of the three resolutions he had made when first captured:
 "No regrets, no sentimentality, and no self-pity.
 I had to stick by that, and it helped me through the whole process of interrogation.
 Self-pity kills. It absolutely destroys."
- 5 Let us pray:

God our Father, in good times may I live in such a way that I will be strengthened for the difficult times that all of us face in our lives. Lead me now to make positive choices to value friendship and loyalty,

and develop attitudes and values, treasuring all that is lasting and important. Throughout difficult times may I build on the positive choices of my past, looking outward in the service of others and avoiding self-pity. May I grow in the faith that, whatever my circumstances, I need have no regrets but may entrust my past to your mercy, my present to your love, and my future to your Providence. May I know, too, that my faith in you is only a shadow of your faith in me and your love for me. Amen.
